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Secondary Transition Planning Is the process of preparing students for life after high school. For students with individualized Education Programs (IEPs): includes planning for postsecondary education/training, employment, and independent living.

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Secondary Transition Planning (continued)

- Transition age range: 14-21
- IEP must contain specific transition goals, plans and services related to his or her interests and needs.
- Families are a required partner on the IEP team and play a valuable role in helping support youth as they work to fulfill their dreams for adulthood.
- You are helping your child plan for life!

What Does High Quality Transition Planning Look Like?

- Schools are the primary provider of transition services, collaborating with Vocational Rehabilitation Services (VRS) to fill in the gaps. This partnership ultimately increases outcomes.
 - Example: A student would like to gain work experience in the area of childcare. The school does not have a relationship with a childcare program. VRS has business relationships and assists in identifying a work site at a childcare center. School and VRS work together to support student.
- IEP updated at least annually. Includes measurable postsecondary goals based on age appropriate transition assessments related to the 3 areas of transition.
- Invite VRS and county case managers to IEP meetings!

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Vocational Rehabilitation Services (VRS)

- State employment services agency that serves people with disabilities
- Division of the Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED)
 - State Services for the Blind (SSB) is a sister agency that serves those who are blind, low vision or DeafBlind
- Partner in the CareerForce system (formerly Minnesota WorkForce Centers)
- 50 CareerForce locations in the state

• VRS serves youth and adults: Any Age 14+!

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Pre-ETS Availability



- Are provided in collaboration between schools and VRS
 - Must be made <u>available</u> statewide to all students with disabilities
 - Any student with a disability who is age 14-21 can receive Pre-ETS

Who is a "Student with a Disability"?

- Has an IEP (in special education); or
- 504 plan; or
- Other medical/mental health documentation



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VRS: Two VRS Staff Assigned to Every School



- VR Counselor and Pre-ETS Representative
 - No wrong door: Send referrals to either staff person
 - Find the staff assigned to your school
 - Or email Alyssa at alyssa.klein@state.mn.us

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Steps for Accessing VRS Services

- Contact one of the VRS staff assigned to the student's school
- 2. They will set up a meeting to explain services and provide an application packet
 - Ideally the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) are there
- 3. VRS verifies student eligibility for services
- 4. Services begin...



...Services Begin

- Ideally a team meeting is held with student, parent(s)/guardian(s), school staff (i.e. IEP case manager)
- Discuss:
 - Pre-ETS needs and what VRS will provide
 - How services will be coordinated with school services
 - How and when services will be provided
 - How communication will take place
 - Follow-up meetings
